

Citroen - Why the Chevron(s)? - Part 2





Before the question is answered, let us have a look at the Citroen 2CV The "Snail" to some (S-Cargo !!). The one on the cover at our Show and Shine was a 1985 model – fairly late.

2CV stands for "deux-chevaux" referring to its two taxable horsepower motor of 375cc originally. The actual HP was about 7.

Although not marketed until 1948, it was the result of planning going back to 1936 after a survey indicated a low-cost small car for farmers and others would be feasible. Specifications to designers included. "The car must transport four passengers, consume three litres of petrol every one-hundred kilometres, be able to carry fifty kilograms of potatoes or a demijohn of wine, have a maximum speed of sixty kilometres per hour, can be driven by women and on the back seat carry a basket of eggs without breaking them"

The project was called the TPV and by 1939 a pilot run was produced. The engine was small to cater for the required tax rate. The car initially had no electric starter with a pull cord like a lawn mower being used. Soon replaced.

With occupation of France looming, the prototypes were hidden. After the war production commenced with the first sold in 1948. The car was a great success with manufacture continuing to 1990 by which time over 3 million in many different forms were produced. Of course it wore the Chevron. Why chevron No room this newsletter - see next.





ASSOCIATIONS INCORPORATION REFORM REGULATIONS 2023

The Minister for Consumer Affairs has recommended that the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 be amended and referred to as the Associations Incorporation Reform 19 November 2023.

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

Summary:

The Associations Incorporation Reform Regulations 2023 (the proposed Regulations) will replace the Associations Incorporation Reform Regulations 2012 (the current Regulations) which are due to expire on 19 November 2023.

The proposed Regulations support the regulation of incorporated associations under the **Association Incorporation Reform Act 2012** (the Principal Act), by prescribing a range of requirements for the establishment, operation and establishment of an incorporated association, including annual reporting. The proposed Regulations also prescribe forms and fees relating to applications for associations to become established and administrative management.

Your committee will establish a response to the foregoing over the Christmas/holiday season and report back in early 2024. The Secretary has suggested a copy of the new regulations be made available to all members, perhaps at cost.
