The story of Australia's first car

A miner's son in rural Victoria built Australia's first ever petrol-driven car at the turn of the century, but it was his shrewd eye and a deal made with Ford that would make him rich.

His father was a miner, but also a keen media man who owned the Clunes Gazette and, later, the St Kilda Chronicle and Prahran Chronicle.

As a result, Tarrant was exposed to a wealth of information and overseas journals where learned he about motoring and became obsessed. Working as a surveyor on the Nullarbor Plain he dreamed of motor vehicles traversing the great expanse and began to write publicity articles on the motor car, which were published in the cycling magazine Austral Wheel.

But Tarrant wanted to do more, much more.

Setting the wheels in motion

Tarrant deduced that steam and electric engines would be unsuitable for the Australian terrain, so he set about building a kerosene engine in 1897 with Howard Lewis.

It was a failure as a car engine, but proved to be a commercial success for pumping water and was widely sold around Australia - giving him a fund to continue work.

Tarrant began importing overseas motor vehicles, beginning with a Benz, to sell in Australia with his new company Tarrant Motor & Engineering Co.

This was also a massive success and it gave Harley the capital he needed to begin work on his second attempt at a motor car.

The Tarrant Motor Car

Tarrant again enlisted the help of cycle maker and business partner Howard Lewis to build his own petrol-driven motor car. This time, they struck gold.

A two-cylinder, two-seater petrol motor car with an imported Benz engine. Two years later, they refined it with their own, locally made engine.

These cars were built for Australian conditions, designed to last long while sacrificing speed.

It was a huge success for Tarrant, but his success would not go unnoticed as the overseas car manufacturers began to take notice. Tarrant effectively had the exclusive on petrol motor cars in Australia, but it wouldn't be long before competition arrived to take him on.

The arrival of Ford

Tarrant continued to see off the challenge of other automobile manufacturers, largely because they were seen as luxury items. Many of the models were way too expensive for the average Australian and the locally produce



Tarrant Motor Car was a model they could afford.

Meanwhile, in the motor city of Detroit, a man named Henry Ford was forging ahead with dreams very similar to Tarrant.

His Model T suited Australian people and conditions perfectly, as they were much more affordable than luxury models and were built to withstand the outback terrain.

Put simply, they were perfect for farmers and farmers could afford them.

Tarrant, through his research, knew when he was licked. The Model T was direct competition to his Tarrant Motor Car, but it had more features, more power and was less expensive – despite being imported. So, Tarrant shut down the production of his own car and acquired the Victorian franchise for Ford in 1907.

In 1908, knocked down versions of the Model T began arriving on Australian shores, to be assembled by dealers.

The rest is history.

Over 15 million Model Ts were sold around the world between 1908 and 1927, with Tarrant earning his slice of the pie by having the foresight to see it would become a massive success in Australia.



Changes to the Club Permit Scheme

September 2021

Introduction of penalties for failure to comply with existing logbook obligations

Club Permit holders must ensure that:

- the Club Permit is affixed inside your club logbook
- each day the Club Permit vehicle is driven outside the vehicle's local zone, you must ensure that the next available entry in the club logbook is completed before you begin your journey
- if your journey begins before midnight and continues into the next day, an entry must be made in the club logbook for both days
- you do not complete or partially complete entries in a club logbook which relate to a future day
- if a club permit is a 45-day Club Permit, only the first 45 entries in the club logbook are used, unless a second 45-day Club Permit is issued for the Club Permit period and affixed inside the club logbook
- if all available entries in a club logbook have been completed, or the Club Permit has expired or been cancelled, the vehicle is not driven outside the vehicle's local zone until a new Club Permit is issued.

Club Permit holders are responsible for ensuring any driver of the vehicle operated under the Club Permit complies with these obligations.

Penalties now apply for logbook offences.

A specific offence for using a Club Permit vehicle as a commercial passenger vehicle is being introduced

There are now financial penalties for using a vehicle operated under a Club Permit:

- for hire or reward for the carriage of goods or freight, or
- to provide a commercial passenger vehicle service as defined by the Commercial Passenger Vehicle Industry Act 2017.

Operating conditions

In addition to the general conditions, VicRoads may impose an operating condition on a Club Permit that specifies the permissible use of the vehicle operating under that Club Permit.

VicRoads may suspend a Club Permit if it is reasonably suspected that the Club Permit holder has failed to comply with any operating condition of the Club Permit specified in the certificate of approved operations. Internal review rights apply.

Cancellation of a Club Permit

VicRoads may cancel a Club Permit if the payment of a relevant fee and the appropriate transport accident charge is dishonoured or not paid within 3 months after the date of expiry of the Club Permit.

Surrender of a Club Permit

A Club Permit holder may surrender a Club Permit. When doing so, you must ensure that at the time the Club Permit is surrendered, the Club Permit, the Club Permit label and the vehicle's club logbook are removed from the vehicle and destroyed. If VicRoads requires it, you must return the Club Permit number plates to VicRoads. Penalties apply for failure to comply.

Definition of a replica vehicle

The Regulations now define a replica vehicle. 'Replica' means a light motor vehicle that is an individually constructed vehicle that resembles, as close as practicable, the appearance and dimensions of the production vehicle on which its design is based. To be eligible for the Club Permit Scheme, replica vehicles must have the appearance and dimensions of a vehicle manufactured more than 25 years ago.

For a replica vehicle to be eligible for inclusion in the Club Permit Scheme, it must meet this definition, and a VASS approval certificate must be provided with the Club Permit application. Individually constructed vehicles and production vehicles are defined in the Vehicle Standards Bulletin (VSB) 14.

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Some regulatory reform proposals will not be progressing in 2021

Based on consideration of stakeholder feedback and an assessment of current feasibility, the Victorian Government will not at this time be progressing the following reforms which were proposed in the consultation process:

- increasing the vehicle eligibility age from 25 years to 30 years for Club Permit vehicles
- requiring vehicles older than 15 years to be recorded on the Written-Off Vehicles Register (WOVR).

There is no plan to introduce the proposal to increase the Club Permit Scheme eligibility age. However, other regulatory proposals will be considered for introduction in the future.



A O M C REPORT November 2021

In accord with all other organisations the AOMC has been unable to hold face to face meetings with delegates, with quarterly meetings for metropolitan and country clubs held by zoom. These virtual meetings have been very well attended.

The AOMC quarterly magazine, the 'Country Motor Australia' magazine and extracts of meeting minutes have all been uploaded to the AOMC website for all club members to read. The news and articles contained therein may be read on the AOMC website 'www.aomc.asn.au'.

On 8 September the Minister for Roads and Safety announced advised the Notice Of Decision of proposed changes to Road Safety Regulations. The BCHAC was one of 1060 submissions to the proposals and the decisions announced by the Minister included amendments to penalty amounts, minor technical amendments and the regulation which concerns the Club Permit Scheme that 'eligibility for club permit registration will remain at 25 years'.
