Guest Speaker - Mat Bowtell

Mat introduced himself as founder and CEO of Free 3D Hands a charity organisation located in Newhaven Phillip Island that relied on donations to continue operating. Mat explained he and his team of engineers develop assisted designs for free to be available all around the world. Commercial prosthetic hands can cost \$10,000 - \$100,000 and not accessible for most of the world population. Free 3D Hands designs are free and accessible to anyone with a 3D printing machine. Mat spoke of their kinetic arm designed recently and have now developed a prototype bionic arm costing \$20 in materials to make. Again designs will be free online for anyone around the world with a 3D printer. Mat explained their goal is to set up hubs around the world with the first in the process of being setup in the Pacific Islands saving the high cost of postage for a hand or arm that cost \$20 in materials to make.

Mat answered many questions from members who showed their appreciation with loud applause.
